### Templates and guidance to support ACP in the context of COVID-19

#### Guidance and top tips for reviewing and updating Key Information Summaries

The Key Information Summary (KIS) is created in the GP clinical system and can be viewed by other health and care services across NHS Scotland.

The number of KIS being completed across health and social care significantly increased from 250,000 in February 2020 to 1.7 million by December 2020.

To support GP practices with the identification and prioritisation of which KIS to update we have developed guidance in partnership with RCGP Scotland and the Scottish Government.

#### The Essential ACP tool

The Essential ACP tool supports clinicians to record information about preferences for care and who should be involved in care decisions in the event of a serious illness.

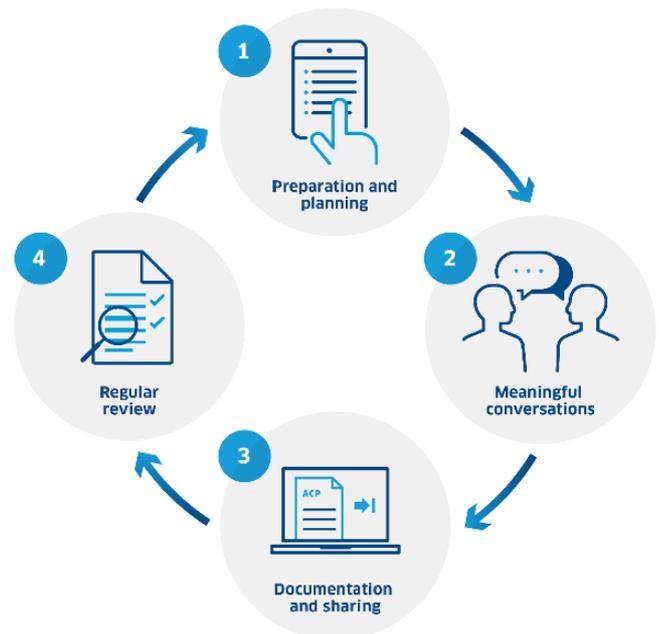
Working with NES Digital Services we have developed the Essential ACP Online tool which enables this information to be collected electronically. The online tool produces a PDF that can be easily copied into a KIS and shared with the patient, therefore supporting person-centred care and good practice.
