

# Developing and implementing a Local Carer Strategy

## Strategic Planning Learning Session | July 2022

This workshop was hosted by the Strategic Planning and Unpaid Carer Improvement teams within the ihub, and brought together 40 delegates representing 17 Health and Social Care Partnerships (HSCP). The workshop was created as a safe space to share learning and approaches to the development and implementation of local carer strategies.

### Session Aims

- Build understanding about current activity and capacity in local areas to develop and implement local carer strategies
- Introduce planning tools and approaches that enable good strategic planning and self reflection
- Identify and share examples of good practice in developing local carer strategies

## Sharing Learning: Glasgow City HSCP

In June 2022, Glasgow City HSCP published their new Carers Strategy. A key priority identified is recognising that the caring journey often begins at the point of diagnosis with an ambition to improve earlier identification of carers by working across health and care services to raise awareness with the wider workforce (see image on right).

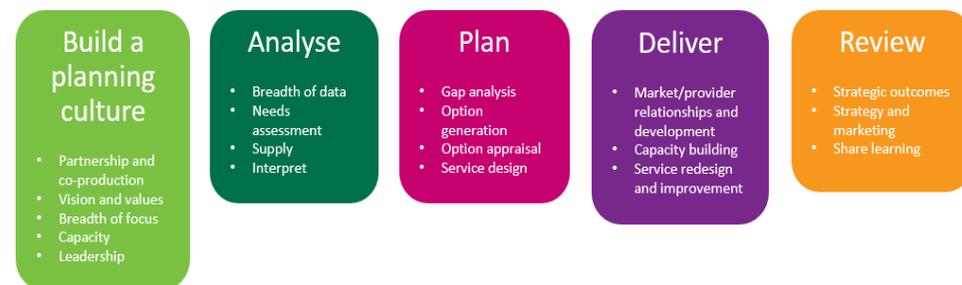
During development of the strategy, the team collaborated across the HSCP to influence wider plans and agendas. An impact story on this activity will be published shortly to share further details.

## Local carer strategies and strategic planning

The aim of strategic planning is to:

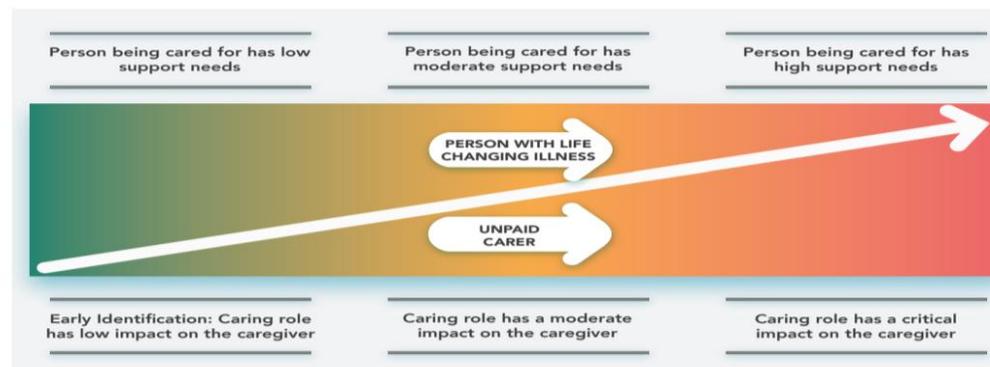
- Understand what complex systems look like and feel like to people using them
- Develop a vision of what systems could and should look and feel like in the future
- Identify the journey to get to that vision

# Building a Planning Culture

To help plan the session and understand the needs of carer leads we asked the following two questions in advance:

## What stage are you at in the development of a new local carer strategy?



14% not started



64% in planning



7% in consultation



14% Published

## Describe your experience of using strategic planning tools and approaches?

Responses outlined a range of strategic planning experience, with the majority of carer leads highlighting an interest in developing further planning skills, particularly in relation to tools:

- Limited experience with engagement and consultations
- I am quite new in post, so any planning tools and approaches would be very welcome
- I have no experience of using strategic planning tools and approaches
- Plenty of experience of planning and project management but not using any particular tools
- No tools as such but strategic planning and wide engagement methods are used with public, professionals and partners

Taking on board the responses to these questions, the learning session focused on 'Building a Planning Culture' and introduced key action areas from the Good Practice Framework for Strategic Planning.

Two key action areas on 'Building a Planning Culture' from the Good Practice Framework for Strategic Planning are:

### Partnership and co-production



Engages with public, carers, service users, workforce, providers from all sectors, in planning, decision making and service delivery

### Capacity



Invests in strategic planning skills, capacity, authority, credibility and time

Participants were asked to reflect on some learning provocations related to these action areas with the aim of identifying areas of strength and areas for improvement. For example:



- Do you empower all partners & collaborators to make decisions & take action?



- Is your case for change presented in a simple yet compelling way? & is it backed up with evidence which supports it

This self-reflection tool has been designed to allow carer leads to consider their own approach to, and capacity for, strategic planning. The tool presents each criteria and action area within the Good Practice Framework, and then invites organisations to consider their own strengths and potential areas of development for each, with scope to then consider and record what actions may be needed to build on these.
